Although he graduated with a National Diploma, it hasn't been smooth sailing for Alexio, despite obstacles that could have deterred him ranging from visual impairment, partial autism and obsessive compulsive disorder, Alexio conquered.

CHIETA OPENS MORE DOORS FOR STUDENTS FOLLOWING THE OPENING OF ITS SATELITE OFFICE AT THE SASOLBURG CAMPUS



The Chemical Industries Education and Training Authority (CHIETA) Executive for grants, projects and regions, Mr. Thulani Shabalala accompanied by the Director of Skills Development in the Free State Province, Me Spa Kabane officially launched the CHIETA Coordinating SETA - TVET Office (CSTO) at Flavius Mareka TVET College, Sasolburg campus. The office was officially launched on the 29th of March 2019.

The CSTO initiative is an official Department of Higher Education & Training (DHET) project to improve the employability of TVET College students. The most significant role of the CSTO is to construct partnerships between the college and employers to assist learners complete their studies by offering the required Work Integrated Learning (WIL) component of their studies.

CHIETA plays a significant role at Flavius Mareka TVET College. The college students are recipients of bursaries



targeting the unemployed youth, WIL Stipends as well as bursaries that fund the lecturer development programme.

According to Mr. Shabalala, the success of this initiative and other programmes is dependent on strong partnerships with various stakeholders. He went on and urged employers to assist learners to complete their studies by providing the required WIL experience.

Me Spa Kabane pointed out that WIL cannot take place if businesses do not come on board, in order to curb the unemployment rate in South Africa businesses have to be on board as government cannot deal with issues of unemployment, skills development and employability on its own.





IMPROVING EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR TVET COLLEGE YOUTH

Work Integrated learning (WIL) is an educational programme that integrate theoretical academic learning of a discipline with its practical application in the workplace. The aim is to ensure that students develop the ability to integrate their learning through a combination of academic and work-related activities.

Flavius Mareka TVET College CEO and Principal, Ntate Thabo Letho had serious discussions with local employers during a stakeholder engagement session hosted by the Sasolburg Campus on the 27th of March 2019.

The main purpose of this session was for the College to establish and maintain collaborative partnerships with local businesses, industries and government entities.



The manager of the Projects Business Unit - Placements, Skills and Learnerships, Ntate Reuben Lethule reiterated on the importance of employers to open up WIL opportunities for TVET students. With the unemployment rate of TVET graduates sitting at 33% not only will these opportunities create employment for students, they will push them a step closer to graduating with a National Diploma as WIL is a prerequisite to graduate.

Ntate Lethule profusely thanked the various stakeholders who had a hand in the placement of students for the 2018/2019 financial year. The College placed 538 students for the WIL programme across all courses. The Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET), through Sector Education and Training Authorities (SETA's) plays a significant role in ensuring that the public and private sector utilise TVET students with N6 certificates. Offering monthly incentives to the students, at no cost to the employer.





BACK TO CAMPUS AND NEW NORMS



Despite scepticism from some parents, lecturers and students, it was all systems go on both the Sasolburg and Mphohadi Campuses as the Engineering N6 and N3 students returned to Campus after the nationwide lockdown implemented by the government amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. Campuses have been closed since the 19th of March 2020 after the President of South Africa, Cyril Ramaphosa declared COVID-19 a national disaster.

Students returned to Campuses on the 10th of June as part of the Minister of Higher Education and Training, Science and Innovation, Dr Blade Nzimande's plan to save lives and the academic year concurrently.

Lebohang Mohlominyana, a student studying Mechanical Engineering N3 at Mphohadi Campus, said that he was excited to be back on Campus. "The lockdown didn't affect my studies that much as I continued to study with previous question papers. I always pushed for at least one question paper per day" said. Mohlominyana.

As part of measures taken to curb the spread of COVID-19 on Campuses, staff members and students were screened on a daily basis. Physical distancing, sanitising of hands as well as wearing of masks has been mandatory.

According to the Health Department in South Africa, there is no need to panic. Statistics show that 82% of COVID-19 cases are mild: patients only experience a slight fever, fatigue and a cough. Only about 6% of patients need intensive care. The vast majority of people can stay at home and get better without hospital treatment.

The most common symptoms of COVID-19 are a cough, fever, sore throat and shortness of breath. Preventative measures include:

- Washing one's hands regularly with soap or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Avoiding the touching of eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- · Avoiding close contact with people who are sick.
- Covering one's cough or sneeze with a flexed elbow or a tissue, then throwing the tissue into the bin.
- Cleaning and disinfecting frequently touched objects and surfaces.

With COVID-19 infections expected to spike in the upcoming months, it is inevitable that we have to get used to a new more careful way of life.

HAIR DRESSER: OCCUPATIONAL CERTIFICATE



Flavius Mareka TVET College is proud to announce that it has been accredited to provide Hair Dresser: Occupational Certificate, NQF Level 4 with 540 Credits. SAQA ID:102497. The entry level for the Hair Dresser course is Grade 9, completed and passed or NQF level 1. This is a two year programme for full time registered students. For part time registered students you can complete the programme in three years. There is a theoretical as well as a practical component, on completion of the training hours at the College; the learner has to gain salon experience before applying for a Summative assessment (Trade test) with the Quality Council for Trade Occupations (QCTO).
